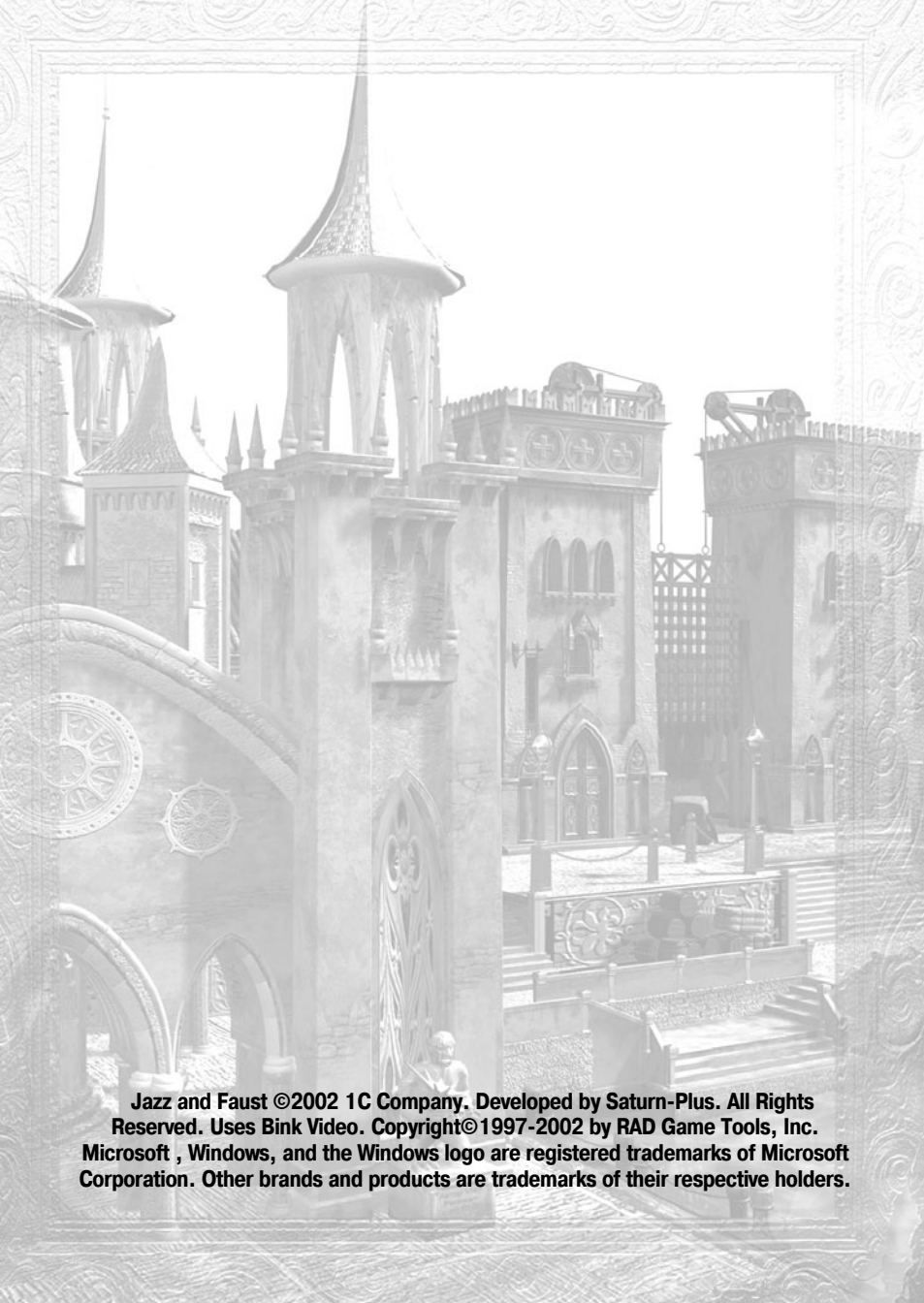

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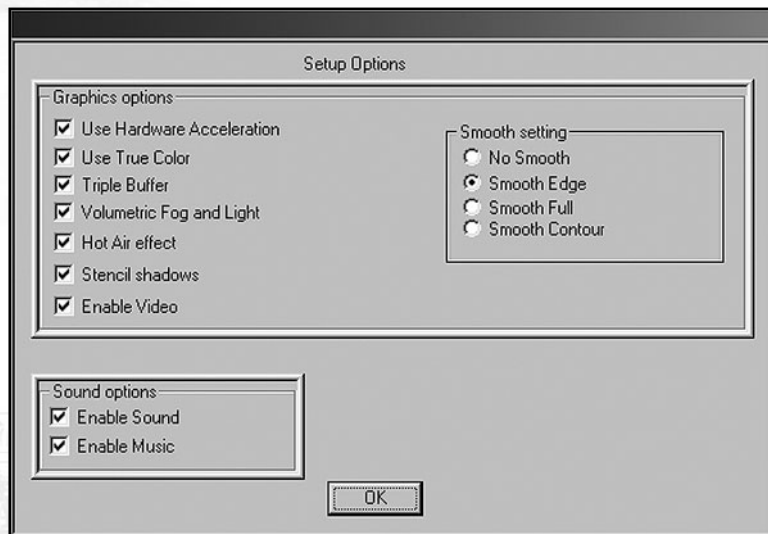
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1. INSTALLATION

The first thing you'll have to do is to insert the CD into the CD-ROM drive of your computer. The "Jazz and Faust" installation program will start automatically. Then simply answer the questions asked by the program and follow the instructions that appear on the screen. If the installation program fails to run automatically use Windows Explorer to find the **Autorun.exe** file and double click it with your mouse. After installation is completed, the game will start.

2. SETUP OPTIONS

The Setup Options window is displayed when the game is started for the first time, when restarting after a crash, or when you launch the config.exe from the installation folder. If you have a high-end computer, you'll want to take full advantage of the beautiful artistry and rich color scheme. Particular attention has been paid to special effects and the interplay between light and shadow. If you wish to increase the speed of the game, you may "switch off" some of the 3D effects displayed in the Setup Options window.



The tick mark in the corresponding box of the Setup window will mean the following:

Use Hardware Acceleration — use of hardware acceleration for video-card (Direct 3D).

Use True Color — use 16 million colors (image will be displayed in maximum realistic colors).

Triple Buffer — use triple buffer, which helps you to increase performance.

Volumetric Fog and Light — turns on/of volumetric fog and light effects.

Hot Air effect — turns on/off air waiving effect over the fire.

Stencil shadows — turns on real shadows cast by characters, use this option for Direct 3D only and video-cards of nVIDIA Riva TNT class and higher.

Enable Video — turns on play back of movies.

Smooth Setting: various variants of antialiasing of characters, please use this option only on powerful computers. Smooth Edge is recommended here.

Enable Sound — turns the sound effects on.

Enable Music — turns the music on.



3. MAIN MENU



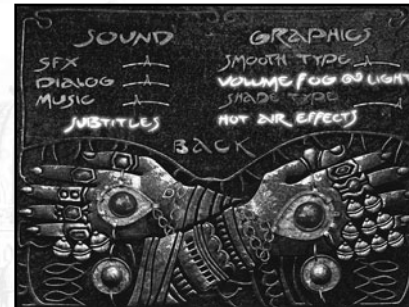
NEW GAME — clicking here enables you to choose a character and start a new game.

LOAD — a click here will load any of the “saved games”.

SAVE — this operation saves a current state of the game — just print a name of the saved game in a specially designed place and press “Enter”.

OPTIONS — select this option to change both sound and graphic settings of the game.

EXIT — if are tired of rushing over locations or feel exhausted by long-lasting dialogues with numerous NPCs you can click here and find long-awaited rest — you'll quit the game and return to Windows.



4. GAME PLAY

4.1. First five minutes of the game

Having watched a nice intro movie, rich with picturesque scenes showing stately frigates floating in the sea, camelcades passing in the deserts and innumerable riches of the East glittering in half-ruined treasures, you'll find yourself in a Medieval tavern and see the characters Jazz and Faust sitting at the table and talking. It's time to start playing the game! By choosing one of the two main characters the game can be started in two different ways! Simply point your cursor to one of the heroes and you will see that the character chosen is lit in a special way and will wave his hand to you. Now you must decide whose story you want to know first — the story of Jazz or the story of Faust. After you have chosen your hero, you simply need to click on him with the left button of your mouse — and the game will start!



4.2. How to start the game

Having chosen your hero, you must fulfill the quest of the chosen character. You CANNOT play for the other one. For example, if you have chosen Faust and played for him for some time you CANNOT start playing for Jazz until you finish walking through the storyline for Faust. You CAN meet the other character by chance and help him to solve some difficult problems — for example, to save him from slavery or to defeat an enemy whose unfriendly and aggressive behavior threatens accomplishment of your plans. The end of the game is the same for the both heroes but in either case you must fulfill various unusual tasks and find your hero in unforeseen situations — so you won't get bored while playing.



4.3. How to control the character

You can move your hero by simply clicking the left mouse button on the place you have chosen — your hero will go straight there. To speed up the action, double click and your hero will start moving to the location at a run. To take any active object and place it into your Inventory just click on it with left button of your mouse. (You can find out if it's active or not by transforming the “cursor-arrow” into “cursor-hand”. You'll be able to get some very useful information about the object. Please refer to clause 4.5 “Cursors”).

4.4. Controls

If you are tired of using the Main Menu you can easily load or save the game with the help of the following hot-keys:

Esc — pressing this key either calls out the Main Menu or brings you back to the game.

F5 — supplies you with a “quick save” function.

F6 — makes quick load easy.

F7 — loads auto-save mode (the game is automatically saved while moving to the other location).

F11 — reduces color spectrum.

F12 — enlarges color spectrum.

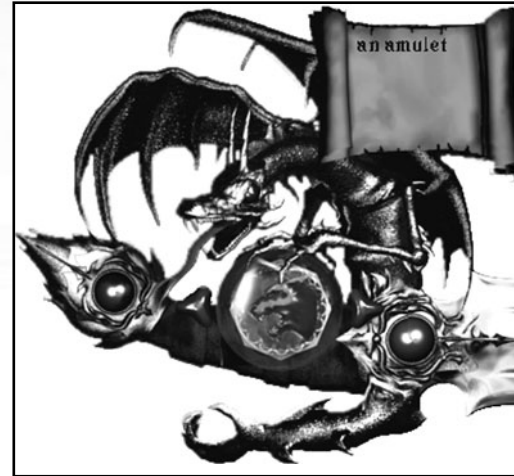
4.5. Cursors

While fulfilling the quest, cursors appearing on your monitor change according to the actions you're making at the moment. The cursor can undergo the following modifications:

-  is used to make the character move over the location.
-  shows that you can move to other location at this particular place.
-  shows that you can use the chosen object at this specific point or place.
-  helps to get information about the object.
-  means that you can take the object pointed with a cursor and place it into your Inventory.
-  means you can talk to the other characters pointed on with this modification of the cursor.

4.6. Using objects

Let's presume that you wandered around some locations for some time and have found many useful and interesting objects. Of course there was no reason to leave them where they were initially placed, and you as a clever and provident person, have picked them up and now want to make use of them. You now need to use your inventory. Click the right mouse button to call out your Inventory List window where the objects you have picked up will be listed. A second click of the right button closes this list — it's also used to cancel your choice of object. The Dragon's claw contains the current object with its description on the scroll located on the right, above the claw. On the left and right of the current object there are buttons which allow you to look over your findings. To use an object, click on it with the left mouse button. So you'd better be attentive and try not to miss any of the active objects (please refer to "Cursors" clause above). This is how your Inventory appears:





5. Game World

Action kicks off in two different places separated by the sea.

On the one side there lies a land of sands, caravans and ghost cities. During the day people here trade with slaves as mere goods for gold and camels. At night, inhabitants of the city gather together with sailors from over the sea to while their time away in sultry teahouses. Stuffy dens in caravansaries are packed with tramps and opium-smokers.



Over the sea, there lies another world made up of towns scattered along the coast. These towns are inhabited predominantly by people who make their living by sea and trade. During the night all human activities here are riveted to the taverns, a perfect meeting place for smuggler seamen and loot dealers.



The third world is an island state. It is situated in the middle of the sea, right on the crossroads of the trade routes. Because of its location, it has absorbed many elements of the neighboring cultures — the city here is a peculiar blend of local spice and multiple borrowings from the two neighboring metropolises.



Although the ways of life in these three worlds are completely different, their inhabitants are overwhelmingly mercantile; they live for the present and are ready to do almost anything for money.

The game world in general looks like a place where brutal passions are driven by cravings for money. Here you stand an equal chance of meeting fearless heroes and desperate scoundrels. In any case you should always be on your guard as these guys stop at nothing.

5.1. Prehistory

Once upon a time there was a country, in the very heart of the desert, which had always been happy and prosperous. But from the depth of the sands, hordes of conquerors pounced upon it. Without warning, advanced detachments of the intruders slipped into the palace of the Supreme Ruler and killed him. The army of the country was smashed as despair and grief came to the inhabitants. The ruling clique of the invaders consisted of people who belonged to a mystical order. Cruel and cunning, Alkaim was their leader. Now the power belonged to Alkaim. His nephew Selim, his closest counselor, possessed a huge power in the order and now, in the country.

But fate willed that the lovely princess Lousa survived. She was but a little child at the time of the conflict, but as soon as she had grown up Alkaim took her to his harem. Soon she had become his favorite wife.

For many years Alkaim showed himself to be a guileful and insatiable ruler. Inhabitants of the formerly rich and prosperous country longed for their past splendor that seemed so unattainable. Selim was a coward at heart and feared requital in case of failure, but treachery and greed had become the decisive factor. The desert would do the evil deed. Selim left the desolate city with all the camels and horses, taking Lousa, but leaving Alkaim in the ghost city, alone, without food or water.

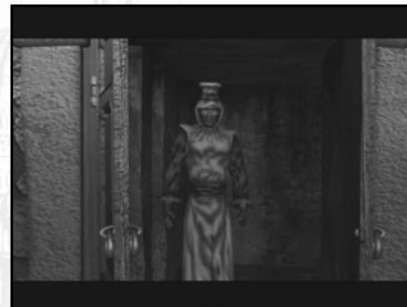

The merchant didn't want to share it between himself and his nephew and so had killed the young man. But God had punished the merchant for his greed. While he was sleeping, his decapitated nephew came to him in a dream and swore to chase him till the required punishment had been served. Trying to avoid the severe penalty that was about to fall on their heads, the merchant and his slave had run at random; finally, they had found themselves in Er-Elp. They wished to settle in this city but couldn't find rest even here. The merchant understood that the more attempts he made to save himself from the awful penalty, the longer was the distance between him and this goal — for it is impossible to hide from oneself. The merchant begged the Chief of the police for protection from the terrible ghost that had turned merchant's life into a nightmare. The Chief of the police thought Selim a madman and strictly recommended all to leave him alone.



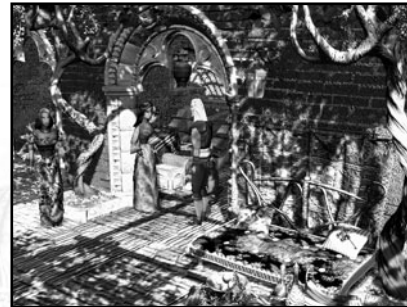

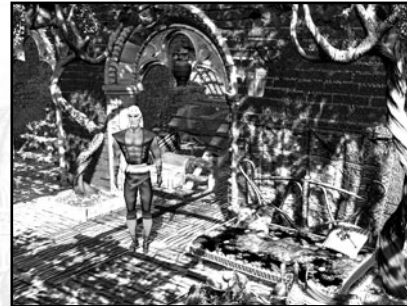
5.2. Characters

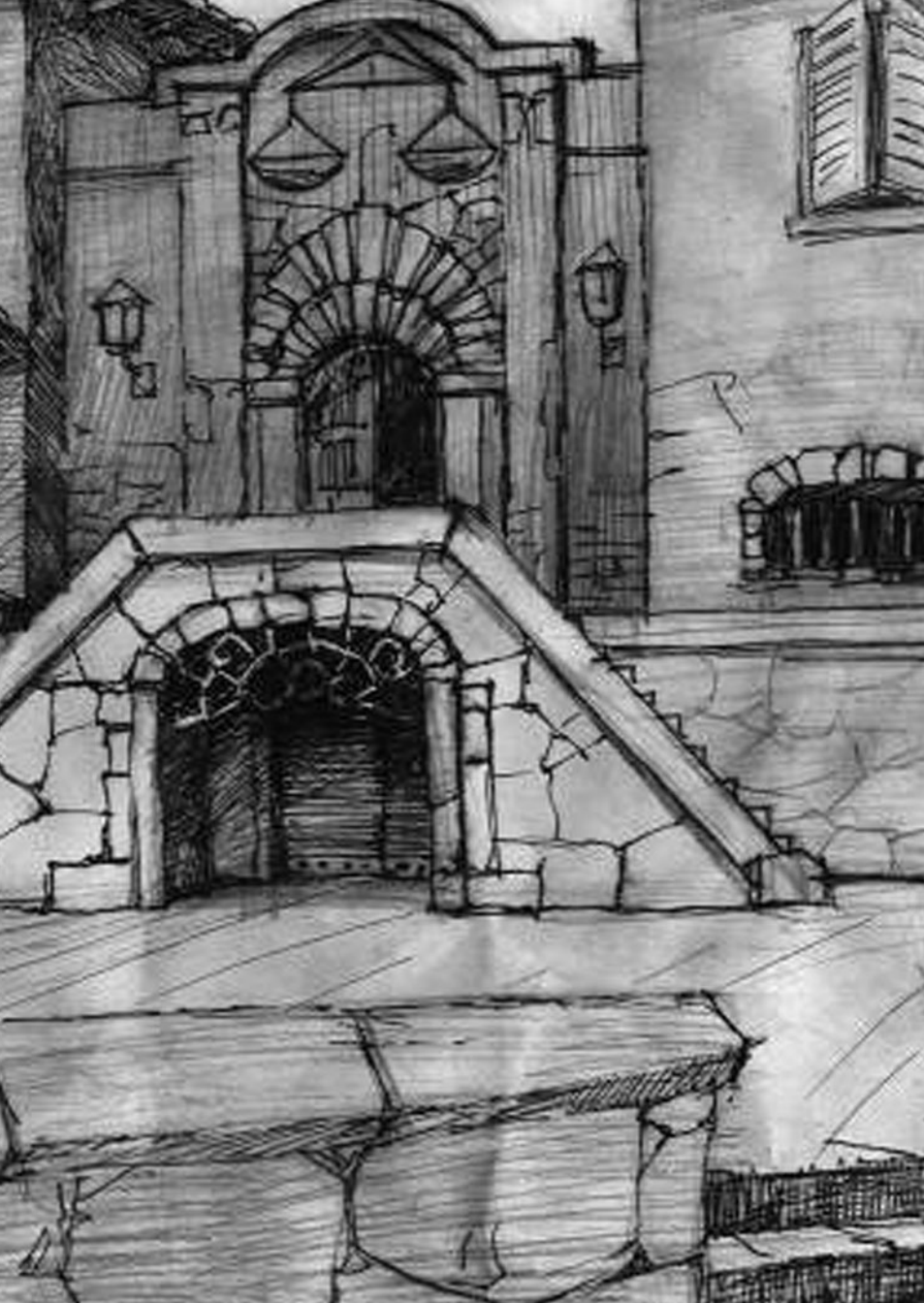
5.2.1. JAZZ
